

**Father Graham writes...**We all come at times to despair and we all tend to lose hope that the suffering in our lives and in our world will ever end. I share with you my faith and understanding that the suffering and the anxiety we are all experiencing can be transformed and redeemed.

There is no such thing as a totally hopeless case. Our God is an expert at dealing with chaos, with brokenness, with all the worst that we can imagine. Scripture confirms that God created order out of chaos - and God can do so now! - in our personal lives - and in our lives as nations, globally! Indeed - God is transforming the world now -- through us - because He loves us!!

One thing many of us are doing right now, during this challenging time of Covid-19, is sharing hope and encouragement on social media.

How can we pass along trusted advice and encouragement? Find a prayer partner and contact each other weekly for prayer. Find ways to share God's love and truth with someone you've been praying for.

There are times in life when we are limited. In his Letters to Timothy, Paul was writing from a dungeon prison. You are most likely reading this from a house you are now bound to, apart from maybe a trip to the grocery store or a walk outside in your garden. A large portion of the globe is currently housebound due to the global pandemic.

But, Paul reminded Timothy, the Word of God is NOT bound! Even in the technologically challenged age in which Paul was writing, the Word of God was spreading: through letters, through God's people, through the growth of the early church, even through persecution.

Nothing can stop God and His Word! Thanks be to God!

## : Reflection on the Passion of Christ : Jesus and Sign Language

John Davies the Archbishop of nia of Jesus. Wales, in his 1997 book, The Crisis of the Cross, discusses how important for establishing the truth and miraculousness of the Resurrection is the recognition that Jesus Christ was both fully human and fully God. He felt the agonies of the Cross in a fully human way which calls forth our admiration, gratitude and love. He makes this point, which I think those who have been watching the PM's press conferences may find interesting:

"The scars are the royal insig- struction that can be caused

When deaf people, for instance, wished to create a sign in sign language for Jesus, they could easily have based a sign on the existing 'power'. signs for 'king', 'lord', or 'glory', 'leader', but they chose the scars, the sign for Jesus is simply to point to the centre of the palm of each hand in turn. The scars show there has been a genuine victory over death and over the powers of prejudice and of forgiveness, over all the deby hatred and malice, over all the corrupted motives of religion and state and public opinion which led to the death of the son of God, the scars of Jesus show that this victory has been achieved in human experience, and it is therefore a possibility for human beings to experience it for themselves.- - - - " Bishop John concludes, " Easter is when, face to face with a verifiable human being, you find yourself driven to cry, My Lord and My God.

I just wonder if after all this is over we will continue to show acts of kindness to each other as he told us to do.
